Message from the Master 23/24

September Webinar

The National Underground Asset Register will be the topic of our webinar on 21st September and will be presented by Guy Ledger, Divisional Digital Director at Atkins Global. There is estimated to be around four million kilometres of buried pipes and cables in the UK, and a hole dug every seven seconds to install, fix, maintain or repair these assets. Approximately one in every 65 holes dug results in an accidental asset strike (c. 60,000 a year), causing around £2.4 billion of economic cost, putting workers' lives at risk and disrupting our day-to-day lives. WCT Sponsored Walk

This year's Sponsored Walk to raise funds for the Water Conservation Trust's schools programme will take place on Sunday 1st October as a walk around the Walthamstow Wetlands. Walthamstow Wetlands are a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) which also forms part of the Lee Valley Special Protection Area and is on the Ramsar List of Wetlands of International Importance. The ten reservoirs offer a haven for overwintering wildfowl, such as pochard and gadwall, and are regionally important for breeding birds such as grey heron, tufted duck and little egret. Swifts visit during the spring and kingfisher and peregrine falcon can be seen all year round. Details will be on our website soon.
