Lord Mayor's Show



The Lord Mayor's Show is 804 years old and has been a fixture of London life for centuries. The modern Show, the world's greatest unrehearsed civic procession, is a joyful and diverse civic parade of over 6000 people, with dozens of marching bands, military detachments, carriages, dance troupes, inflatables, giant contraptions and ceremonial displays.

This year the Show was held on Saturday 9th November, following the Silent Ceremony where the new Lord Mayor swears his oath of office. Alderman William Russell (of the Bread Street Ward) is the 692nd Lord Mayor of London.

Master Mark Lane and his three Wardens took part in the Show by walking with other Modern Livery Companies and thoroughly enjoyed the atmosphere and pageantry.

Water Conservation Trust Sponsored Walk

Early morning torrential rain did not bode well for the Water Conservation Trust Sponsored Walk on Sunday 6th October. However, the weather quickly improved substantially to lift the spirits of the walkers who had volunteered to take part.

This annual event is a major fundraising opportunity for the Trust and this year proved to be no exception. The walkers met midmorning at Chorleywood Station and quickly set off for the planned 7 mile walk along the beautiful Chess Valley

Did you know...? HQS Wellington is the only floating Livery Hall

The Worshipful Company of Water Conservators regularly uses HQS Wellington for its formal events. It is unique in being the only floating Livery Hall, but the history of the vessel is equally unique.

The Honourable Company of Master Mariners had a longstanding ambition to have a Livery Hall of their own. Up to the outbreak of war in 1939, various proposals were examined, including the purchase of the sailing ship, the Archibald Russell.



After the war, it became apparent that the possibility of building a Hall in the City of London had been rendered very remote. In 1947, the Grimsby class sloop Wellington was made available by the Admiralty. The Company decided to buy her with money subscribed by the Members and convert her to a floating Livery Hall – an appropriate home for a Company of seafarers.

Built at Devonport in 1934, HMS Wellington served in the Pacific mainly on station in New Zealand and China before the Second World War. During the war, Wellington was fitted with two 4.7 inch guns and one three inch gun - additionally, anti-aircraft guns

to Chesham. The walk was ably led by Thames Warden Rob Casey and Past Master Peter Hall, who only admitted to getting lost once! After a half-way stop for liquid refreshment at the Red Lion in Chenies, the intrepid walkers made it in the dry to Chesham by

Personal sponsorship and generous matched funding by Thames Water's Charity Committee resulted in over £3,000 being raised to support the Trusts important schools' education programme. Well done to everyone who took part.

3.30pm for a late pub lunch.

Rob Casey Thames Warden were fitted for self defence. Depth charges for use against submarines were also carried. HMS Wellington served primarily in the North Atlantic on convoy escort duties - she shared in the destruction of one enemy U boat and was involved in Operation Dynamo, the evacuation of troops from Dunkirk

After the war she was converted from being His Majesty's Ship Wellington to Head Quarters Ship Wellington at the Chatham dockyards. The cost of this conversion was met by an appeal to which Lloyd's, Shipping Companies, Livery Companies and many other benefactors generously contributed. She arrived at her Victoria Embankment berth in December 1948 to continue service as the floating livery hall of the Honourable Company of Master Mariners.

In 1991 HQS Wellington was drydocked at Sheerness for three months during which extensive works were undertaken to make the ship a Livery Hall which is admired throughout the City of London.

Water Science, Policy & Management MSc at Oxford

The course is taught at the University's School of Geography and the Environment which, for many years, has been ranked number 1 in the World.

The event was opened by Lord Chris Patten, after which a discussion panel of alumni recalled experiences of their time on the course and how it influenced their career and future work. Among the panellists were Alex Money, Tim Foster and Abishek S. Narayan (winner of the Conservators' Prize for the best dissertation of his year). Alumni from

all years and their guests, including a number of liverymen, enjoyed an evening of recollection and fun that finished with drinks and a range of extremely good canapes.



A judging panel will short list entrants who will be invited to a special event at the City Centre, Guildhall on 20 March (prior to World Water Day) where the winner will be announced. Runners up will receive places at a free sustainability workshop run by New London Architecture which has received critical acclaim.
